It's the end of the semester and you're in your last class for Psych 101 and having finished the curriculum, the professor prompts you to do a survey before you leave and he stands in the class waiting as it is being taken. As you carefully bubble in the survey, you notice within 5 minutes of starting the survey, students have already started handing the survey in, completing open ended questions and over 15 multiple choice questions regarding the quality of the class. This exact scenario was played out to me in multiple classes last semester so I conducted a survey this semester to see why this was the case. The survey I conducted consisted of three questions to understand how students had felt about the current process of administration. Over 75% responded either often or very often to the question of, "Have you ever rushed through the end of the semester survey for a class to simply leave/end faster", 60% to "My professor stayed in the classroom during surveys" and 85% either agreed or strongly agreed to "My individual survey responses are not significant." The survey data brings about the problem that there is a need for better handling for the way that surveys are treated in CCNY. Students and faculty do not take the surveys as seriously as they should be.

The university of Wyoming recently released a paper titled "Do Students Tell the Truth on the Prevention Needs Assessment (PNA)?" where they analyzed several factors impacting the participation of students in surveys. These factors constituted include anonymity, restricting
